Introduction	
Purpose of this risk assessment	<ol> <li>To analyse the effect on the safety of pedestrians (member of public) of closing a road or roads during the 3 day event.</li> <li>Provide suitable documentation to make an application to the Council for road closure if required.</li> <li>Explain the options considered and the conclusions.</li> </ol>
Scope of the assessment	<ol> <li>This assessment considers 4 options ranging from no road closures to the closure of the town centre roads (High Street; New Road, parts of Kingsbury Street and Upper Parade). Closing only one carriageway has not been assessed as it was not chosen to be one of the principle possible options.</li> <li>This assessment considers the event to be town centre venues (existing and pop-up) some with marques and a large marquee (500 person) in Priory Gardens.</li> <li>The Risk Assessment considers the risk of foreseeable and significant hazard. For the purpose of this assessment the risk of serious injury and fatality is considered.</li> <li>The risk assessment considers pedestrians including general traffic as well as festival-goers. Cyclists are considered within the label of pedestrians.</li> <li>In the event of new information, for example, accident history; it may be necessary to review the location of the Festival and reconsider the Festival aims using existing venues with an out of town venue if such a venue would provide a high level of safety.</li> </ol>

## **Event description**

The Marlborough Jazz Festival takes place in Marlborough Town Centre and uses existing pubs and clubs for its venues, some pop-up venues and a large marque in Priory Gardens. Several venues install marquees on their property others use existing spaces at their premises. Capacities in the majority of venues range from 40 people to 200 people.

In addition to the pubs and clubs a large marquee installed by Marlborough Jazz Festival in Priory Gardens. This is the largest venue with a capacity of 500 people.

Number of people (public) attending the event	Venue capacity, comprising of circa 20 separate venues:  It is estimated that there is capacity at the venues for 2500 persons.  Over the 3 day Festival (Friday night, Saturday and Sunday) is it estimated that c10, 000 people will attend.
Anticipated areas of high crowd density	The area around The Parade and the Town Hall has a cluster of venues and is likely to attract a significant percentage of those attending the Festival. Many of the Festival-goers will be inside a venue but crowds are anticipated on the pavements and roadways as festival goers move between venues.
Possibility of event crowds spilling onto the highway	There is a risk that festival-goers could spill onto the highway near events who premises are close to the highway and those events with outside spaces near the highway and those events with access and egress near the highway.
History of accidents and incidents to the public during the festival involving pedestrians and vehicles (a) on the highway, (b) on other vehicle routes	During previous festivals there has been no record of any accident and incident related to vehicle collision with pedestrians on (a) the highway nor on (b) other vehicle routes. <sup>1</sup>

Violailita	This option provides the best risk analysis results of the options considered.						
Viability	Interested parties should be consulted, those persons (businesses / residents) on the highway which would be closed.						
Effects	This closure would remove moving vehicles from New Road eliminating accident and incidents in this stretch of the highway which was observed to be a higher risk area than the other roads. This closure also removes moving vehicles from the lower part of Kingsbury Street eliminating accident and incidents in this stretch of the highway which was observed to have an elevated risk compared with High Street. This closure also removes moving vehicles on the upper part of the Parade which will be a pedestrian congested area and therefore an elevated accident risk if moving vehicles are present.						
	There would be some disruption for the general town traffic, businesses and residents, public transport and for the emergency vehicles but not believed to be to an unmanageable extent. Consultation would need to be organised and actions taken to address any concerns.						
Acceptable diversions	Some through traffic would travel along Pewsey Road and George Lane. Some would bypass New Road on adjacent surrounding roads.

The conclusions must be re-assessed in the light of any changes to the assumptions and observations. The assumptions and findings must be checked by The MJF Committee.
When the traffic management plan has been completed indicating traffic flow and positioning of barriers, signs, etc., then MJF Committee will ensure that a detailed risk assessment is completed.

# Photographs showing the High Street





- The High Street was observed to have slow moving traffic with many drivers stopping to allow pedestrians to cross.
- The High Street has a centre parking arrangement allowing pedestrians to cross a single lane of traffic to the safety of the centre. There is also parking on the sides of the roads. Cars were observed manoeuvring with care and at low speeds.

# Photographs showing New Road





- New Road was observed to have traffic moving at a far higher speed than traffic moving on the High Street. Drivers on New Road were obviously braking for pedestrians on the crossing but at other points were traveling at or close to the speed limit.
- New Road has a pedestrian pavement on one side and no pedestrian pavement on the other.

# Photographs showing New Road







- There is no pavement for properties on the south-side of New Road.
- The Piano bar garden has gates onto New Road. It has been one
  of the Jazz Festival venues and the garden has been used during
  the event with attendees exiting onto New Road.
- If New Road is not to be closed to traffic, discussions with the Piano Bar must be undertaken to discuss closing the garden access for safety reasons. Emergency escape plans will need to be reviewed.

## Photographs showing Kingsbury Street and The Parade





- Traffic speed on Kingsbury Street is higher than High Street; lower than New Road. The road is narrow and has a sharp bend which slows traffic but affects safe crossing. Kingsbury Street is not suitable for use by HGV.
- The top of The Parade joins with New Road






 Crossing the road safely (based on observation and judgment; all classes of person)






A. Town Centre map indicating the extent of the venues across the town centre




#### B. Map indicating observed traffic speeds.


- Marked Green: The High Street was observed to have slow moving traffic which frequently stops to allow pedestrians to cross.
- Marked Red: New Road for a variety of reasons has much faster traffic speeds and it is dangerous to cross including on the zebra crossing.





#### **Risk Assessment Notes**

The terms 'hazard' and 'risk' are frequently used in the Regulations, Approved Codes of Practice and guidance. It is important to appreciate what these terms mean:

- Hazard is the potential to cause harm
- → Risk is a function of the probability (or likelihood) of that harm actually occurring and the severity of its consequences

#### Assessment of the Risk

For each aspect identified it is necessary to document the possible risk and then identify the control measures that are currently in place to protect the persons exposed to the hazard.

Current control measures may include physical controls (e.g. guarding, personal protective equipment (PPE), etc.), procedural controls (e.g. safe working procedures, information, instruction and training) or monitoring (e.g. maintenance inspections, statutory testing, etc.).

An assessment of the risk then needs to be made. In the majority of cases, the level of risk associated with a task can be derived from experience. In certain circumstances a more systematic approach may be necessary. In both cases, the aim of assessing the risk is to produce a priority list of hazardous tasks and aspects for action planning purposes. The higher the risk - the greater the need for control measures. This assessment of risk is categorised as **Low**, **Medium** or **High**.

Having established the current control measures, the next stage is to decide whether they reduce the risk of harm to the persons exposed to an acceptable level. When establishing how effective the control measures are at reducing the risk, it is important to consider factors such as whether the control measures are suitable for the types of hazard, are they used by the persons at risk and are they adequately maintained.

If it is decided that that the current control measure do not provide sufficient protection to the persons exposed, then further action is required.

Using a matrix can be helpful however care and attention is necessary to judge the likelihood of harm and the probability. Getting this wrong could result in applying **unnecessary controls** or failing to take **important action**. The matrix and interpretation should not detract from ensuring that necessary Risk Controls are implemented.

Decisions as to whether or not further action is needed can then be made by reference to the following matrix:

#### PRIORITY KEY

High - Urgent Action recommended	Not safe; immediate attention required to reduce the risk
Medium - Action necessary	Can be safer; must receive attention to reduce the risk
Low - Lower priority	Improve if possible after completing Urgent and Necessary actions; review periodically

#### **Further Action Required**

When considering what further action is required the following hierarchy of measures to prevent or reduce the exposure of person to the hazardous is considered:

- Elimination e.g. buying ready sawn timber rather than using a chainsaw
- Substitution by something less hazardous and with less risk.
- Enclosure Guarding / segregation of people
- Safe system of work Written procedures that are known and understood by those affected.
- Adequate supervision.
- Identification of training needs Information / instruction
- Personal protective equipment

In most cases a suitable combination of control methods will be necessary.

#### **Reviewing the Assessment**

The Assessment should form a 'living' document, which is revisited if circumstances change. It should certainly be reviewed when:

- There is reason to suspect the assessment is no longer valid; There has been a significant change; The results of monitoring shows it to be necessary; The review date given on the assessment is reached.
