

People encouraged to have their say on extended consultation into special schools

People are encouraged to have their say on the [consultation](#) for how Wiltshire Council can best invest at least £20m into providing special school education in the future. The consultation is live until 6 May 2019.

Wiltshire Council has taken the decision to extend the consultation after an agreement was reached with families.

A group of families had taken a case to court about the process and had been granted a hearing to consider elements of the case, scheduled to be heard next month.

In order to foster good working relationships with families, prevent further delay and to conserve public money and cost for both parties, the council agreed a new way forward.

Wiltshire Council withdrew the decision to approve a statutory notice about the closure of three special schools (Larkrise, Rowdeford and St Nicholas), and the related notice regarding the opening of a new special school in Rowdeford.

Wiltshire Council will now treat all previous consultation and responses that took place between 9 January 2019 and 1 March 2019 as part of a pre-publication consultation. This means they are part of an initial consultation on what proposals should be published for further consideration. This is a process with a number of steps, and the council is re-opening the first stage. The council will reach a decision about the next steps after the end of the extended consultation period.

The previous proposal to close the three special schools, Rowdeford, Larkrise and St Nicholas and to build a new school at Rowdeford remains an option. However, Wiltshire Council will take into consideration all responses which differ from those as part of an inclusive and wide-ranging reconsideration of consultation submissions.

Consultation responses already provided to the council will be automatically considered as pre-publication consultation, and do not need to be resubmitted. If you would like to submit further information, please note that this can be forwarded to specialschools@wiltshire.gov.uk.

A new decision on the steps to be taken should then be made by the council's cabinet this summer. A summer decision will mean that the timetable for future SEND provision will still be met.

Face to face discussions on investment in special schools continues next week

Wiltshire Council is holding face to face discussions with schools and families on how to best invest at least £20m into providing special school education as part of the extended pre-publication consultation.

In March the council extended the consultation into how Wiltshire can prepare for the additional places needed as well as providing excellent provision into the future.

As part of the consultation, Wiltshire Council is hosting three meetings with schools and families to talk about special needs education with a focus in the north of the county. The first was held earlier this month and the next two will be held on the following dates:

2 May 6:30pm 8pm at John of Gaunt School, Trowbridge

3 May 11am to 12:30pm at the Devizes Sports club on London Road in Devizes

The meetings are an opportunity to discuss potential options. The previous proposal to close the three special schools, Rowdeford, Larkrise and St Nicholas and to build a new school at Rowdeford remains an option. However, Wiltshire Council will take into consideration all responses which differ from this as part of an inclusive and wide-ranging reconsideration of consultation submissions.

Information morning will map out future SEND provision for south Wiltshire

People are invited to find out more about provision for special needs places in the south of Wiltshire.

An information morning will be held at the Salisbury Diocesan Education Centre on Wednesday 1 May 2019 from 11am - 12:30pm

The morning will be an opportunity to hear about current provision and the plans Wiltshire Council is developing to meet the need for the future.

Springfields South opened in February 2019 for Autistic Spectrum Disorder (ASD) and Social, Emotional and Mental Health (SEMH) pupils in the south.

It provides education for up to 18 primary and lower secondary age pupils at Sarum Academy, Salisbury. The Springfield's and Sarum Academy are working closely with Exeter House School in Salisbury, who also support children and young people with ASD and complex needs.

In February 2019 it was announced Wiltshire Council had additionally secured £12m funding from the Department for Education (DFE) to create a new 150-pupil free school for pupils aged 4 to 19 years by 2026.

The school will be for children and young people with ASD and SEMH in the south of the county and will have strong links with mainstream schools, nurseries and children's centres. The information morning will be chance to talk about how these schools can meet need and be developed.

OVO Energy Tour Series returns to historic Salisbury in May



Salisbury will welcome Britain's best teams and riders once again in May as the OVO Energy Tour Series returns to the cathedral city.

Having hosted the 100th round in series history and the event's 10-year anniversary in May 2018, Britain's leading televised cycle series heads to the Wiltshire city on Thursday 23 May for this season's penultimate showdown.

Last year's round, watched by 12,000 spectators as well as TV viewers around the world, memorably saw three-time Olympic champion Ed Clancy take individual honours in the men's race. The 1.2-kilometre (0.7-mile) circuit based around Guildhall Square and Market Place also holds good memories for the Canyon Eisberg and Team Breeze squads, who were crowned last year's men's and women's series champions respectively in Salisbury.

The Wiltshire venue joins Redditch, Motherwell, Aberdeen, Durham, Birkenhead and Brooklands as the last of the confirmed locations for the 2019 OVO Energy Tour Series.

Among the likely contenders to Canyon dnb p/b Bloor Homes' crown are Madison Genesis, 2015 men's champions and last year's runners-up, Team WIGGINS Le Col and Vitus Pro Cycling. Meanwhile Storey Racing and Brother-Tifosi look set to challenge Team Breeze in the ever-competitive women's title race.

As well as being an unticketed, free-to-attend event, the OVO Energy Tour Series is unique in the world of cycling, as the focus in both the men's and women's competition is on the teams, who battle for the overall title based on the performance of all five of their riders in each round.

Highlights of the OVO Energy Tour Series are screened on ITV4 and broadcast around the world, while event days provide the opportunity for a range of community and cycling activities to take place on closed-road circuits.

BBC Wiltshire Live Music Stage announced as part of this summer's Armed Forces Day National Event three-day spectacular in Salisbury

BBC Wiltshire has been announced as a key media partner for the celebration of the Armed Forces which will bring thousands to Salisbury on the last weekend of June (28 - 30).

The local radio station will create the BBC Wiltshire Village, which will have local acts on stage between 3pm and 6.30pm on the Saturday and Sunday. There will also be the interactive BBC bus on which people can have a go at being a presenter.

In addition, the Listening Project vehicle, which is a partnership between BBC Wiltshire, BBC Radio 4 and the British Library, will be capturing conversations as part of a legacy project. More details on this, and other exciting developments from BBC Wiltshire will be promoted nearer the time, and it promises to be a real draw on the day.

There is a packed programme over the three days with Friday focusing on saying thank you to serving military personnel with a free barbecue for them and their families followed by a concert that is open to everyone.

On Saturday morning the military will parade through the streets of the city centre, a spectacle that is expected to be watched by thousands of people. The line-up at Hudson's Field on Saturday includes an air show, military demonstrations, live entertainment culminating with a free to attend live entertainment and fireworks.

Sunday focuses on veterans and young people those who have served and those who may serve with a commemoration and drumhead service, supported by the Royal British Legion, with the Bishop of Salisbury and padres leading the service. There will also be the opportunity to help the event attempt to break a record by creating the world's largest human poppy in the main arena.

Local bands and acts Duck n Cuvver, The Treblemakers and Salisbury Rock Choir will each perform on the main stage on one of the three days at Hudson's Field after winning a Facebook competition.

The platinum sponsors are KBR Aspire Defence and Lovell. SSAFA, the armed forces charity, has been announced as the official main charity sponsor and the Royal British Legion is a charity partner. General Dynamics, Landmarc, MiPermit and Nationwide Engineering are also supporting the event as gold sponsors.

Armed Forces Day is a chance to show support for the men and women who make up the Armed Forces community from current serving troops to service families, veterans and cadets. Armed Forces Day nationally takes place on the last Saturday in June, this year it is on 29 June with the national event being held in Salisbury. Celebrations begin on Monday 24 June when the Armed Forces Day flag is raised on buildings and landmarks across the country. Showing support for the Armed Forces provides a much-valued morale boost for troops and their families.

Our homeless strategy sets out our vision, aims and key priorities to help prevent and reduce homelessness in Wiltshire. The key priorities are:

- Reduce rough sleeping
- Identify and prevent homelessness at the earliest possible stage
- Ensure services are designed to prevent homelessness and support those who are homeless.
- Ensure those who are threatened with homelessness or who are homeless can secure and keep a suitable home.
- Maintain effective strategic direction and partnership working
