1.	I welcome the idea of restricting the road traffic speed, as I reside in Alfred Street and have been living here for the past eight years. I have seen changes in the traffic flow during this time and I will be pleased to see this proposal introduced. Recently signs were placed at both ends of Alfred Street warning HGV drivers that the road in unsuitable for their vehicles. Regrettably these signs have been ignored and the articulated trucks continue to block the road. This then leads me to the speed restriction suggested here which will fail if not properly policed. We now have electric scooters exceeding the 20mph as I followed one recently in my car doing 27 mph. Glovers Row, which connects Alfred Street to Gibbs Close, is a new road having been introduced due to nine new houses being built at the rear of my property and has a parking area for eighteen houses. This small road is very busy and furthermore is attracting parking by residents of Alfred Street, as they have been deprived of parking in their own street. There will be accidents in this street, and I think you should be forewarned. There is a pavement one side of this new road, which is narrow and is in continuous use as it is a direct route to the local school for Parents and Children. When the construction of the new houses was being considered, Alfred Street was to have a speed reducer (sleeping policeman) installed. Perhaps it could be reconsidered. I have a copy of the original paperwork, but I am sure you have it on file somewhere. Whilst this speed restriction is welcomed, I would also like to see one continuous pavement from the Market Place to Bratton Road.	Support with comments	Comments in support of the proposal are noted. The introduction of a 20-mph speed limit requires the installation of signing and road markings only. In order to include traffic calming features such as speed humps, this would require the introduction of a 20-mph zone, these are considered to be self-enforcing and are different to a speed limit. The proposal requested and supported through Westbury LHFIG is for the introduction of a 20-mph speed limit (not a zone) and as such will include the installation of signs and road markings only. Please refer to Department for Transport Circular 01/2013 Setting Local Speed Limits section 4 for further information on the difference between speed limits and zones Setting local speed limits - GOV.UK (www.gov.uk) The introduction of a 20mph speed limit has been recommended after the completion of a full assessment, in which the data collected in relation to speed resulted in a 20mph speed limit being considered the most appropriate solution for this location. Given the current speeds it is not considered necessary for a 20mph zone or traffic calming features to be implemented.

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2.	We are writing following receiving confirmation of the 20mph speed limit order, specifically to Alfred Street. As resident homeowners along Alfred Street, we are extremely happy that this will be introduced and look forward to the changes being implemented. Both we and other residents have experienced a number of persistent issues with road traffic over the last few years: 1. Vehicles speeding both up and down the road causing a danger to other road users along with producing an unacceptable level of noise pollution. This occurs frequently, particularly at the Conservative club end of the road where there is a blind corner. 2. A number of cars and motorbikes have modified exhausts which they deliberately rev and 'pop' causing excessive noise pollution throughout the day and night. 3. HGV lorries and large vehicles ignoring the 'Unsuitable for HGV vehicles' signs at either end of the road and persisting to use Alfred Street as a cut through. As you well know, this has resulted in damage to property, noise pollution, and present a danger to other road users.
